

Smith has glided over, around and through taller defenders for a 24.7 points-per-game average through

the Ponies' first 12 contests, and has scored at a 27.3 clip during the past six games.

"Jon does a lot of things right." Ward says: "He makes a few mis-

takes, but he's so quick it's just un-

real."

Smith has had games of 28 points once. 29 points three times, and 31 points twice. Last year as a junior, playing in the shadows of David Wade and Kevin Dillard, he averaged 13.2 during the regular season, hitting double figures 14 times.

Wade and Dillard have graduated. This year, assuming the same role as that held by the John

Smith of Pocahontas fame, Jon Smith is the "captain" of the Ponies' attack.

He expects the lessons he's learned this year will help him in the future.

"Yeh, I'm going to go to college." he says confidently. "I want to make a career for myself and get my degree in physical education or something like that."

His dream doesn't end there

"The pros." he says. "I'd like to grow to about 6-1, then I think I could I could play in the pros."

The slender Smith has been working toward his dream for at least nine years. He started in the Huntington Buddy League, playing for Tradewell and Huntington Gold, and has continued through years at the YMCA. Oley Junior High and, now, Huntington High.

Between games and seasons, he and brother Randy — who played at Huntington St. Joe for two seasons — spend long and busy hours practicing.

"I used to stay up until 2 o'clock in the morning playing at Scott Community Center," he remembers

Randy also attends Huntington High, but is ineligible to play basketball this season because he transferred from St. Joe.

"Randy's quicker than me; he plays better defense than me," Jon says. "He's strictly an assist man."

Jon is trying to become the complete player. He works on his shooting, passing, and leaping. He exercises. And, he expects to run distance events for HHS this track season, hoping to better his speed and endurance even more.

"I'll play point guard in college.

so I've got to work on my dribbling," he says, "And my set shot it's not on right now. I don't know what's wrong with it, but I'll get it."

Smith, point guard Dwaint Barnes and speedy Gaston Walker have led a Ponies' fast break that at times this season, has resembled a blur. But still, Smith is not satisfied.

"We use our quickness to tranalot, but we haven't been running good lately," he says. "We've go to run. That's our game."

If the Ponies don't run, they don't win. They have to overcome big height disadvantages nearly every time out, and they do it will speed — and Smith's shooting.

It's paid off. With an 8-4 record Huntington High began the seasor slowly. But, the Ponies now have a five-game winning streak and an climbing higher in the state ratings weekly.

Tuesday night. Huntington traveled to Charleston and sounds whipped a fine Stonewall Jackson team that had defeated the Ponie earlier in Huntington. So, there every reason to believe Hunting ton is beginning a stretch drive to ward a shot at the West Virgina Class AAA championship.

"I think we're going to win it." Smith says. "We've just got to ru more."
